Museveni intervenes in Kyaligonza-Odrek row

President Yoweri Museveni, the ruling NRM chairman, has intervened to calm a row between Maj Gen (rtd) Matayo Kyaligonza and the political novice Odrek Rwabwogo, The Observer has learnt.

Rwabwogo, the president's son-in-law, has brought unwelcome attention to the first family in recent weeks, with his campaign to unseat Kyaligonza NRM vice chairperson Vestern Uganda.

The Observer understands that a meeting took place at State Lodge Nakasero on Tuesday, where President Museveni met both Rwabwogo and Kyaligonza largely to mediate an amicable solution to their political rivalry for the NRM position.

Maj Gen Kahinda Otafiire, another contender for Kyaligonza's seat, has been quietly going about his campaigns and did not join the belligerent duo at State

Guidance to all Presidential Aspirants Conducting Consultative Meetings

The Electoral Commission started issuing nomination forms to aspiring Presidential candidates on 17th August 2015, and the exercise is ongoing. A number of aspirants have already collected the forms and have embarked on consultative meetings to obtain the required signatures in preparation for nomination.

Section 1 of the Presidential Elections Act, 2005 defines an aspirant to mean a person intending to stand as a candidate during election for the office of the President.

A candidate under the Presidential Elections Act. means a person duly nominated as a candidate for a Presidential Election, under Section 10.

According to the Electoral Commission's Election Roadmap, campaigns for the various elective positions, Presidential Elections inclusive, as guided by law commences after the Electoral Commission has duly nominated candidates for the respective elective

However, Section 3 of the Presidential Elections Act, 2005, enjoins aspiring candidates to carry out consultations in preparation for nominations and the aspirant

a. carry out nation-wide consultations;

b. prepare his or her manifesto and other campaign

c. raise funds for his or her campaign through lawful

d. convene meetings of national delegates.

While consulting, the aspirant is required to introduce himself or herself to the Electoral Commission and notify the relevant Local Council and the Police of the area to which he or she goes.

It should be noted that Section 3 of the Presidential Elections Act, 2005, provides for aspirants to consult, activities involved inclusive, in preparation for nomina-

These consultations, however, should be distinguished from distribution of campaign materials, campaigns, holding rallies and mass meetings and canvassing/soliciting for votes envisaged under Sections 21 and 24 of Part V of the Presidential Elections Act.

The Electoral Commission advises all aspirants to comply with the requirements of the Presidential Elections Act, 2005 and other applicable laws in regard to undertaking the consultative activities.

New parliament works could start in January

Plans to build new, larger parliamentary chambers have gained momentum, following construction permission from city and environmental authorities.

According to parliamentary sources, building plans were recently approved by Kampaia Capital City Authority (KCCA) and the National Environment Management Authority

The Parliamentary Sergeant at Arms, Ahmed Kagoye, confirmed the development, revealing that the building plans were done by Sentoogo and Partners and submitted to the office of the parliamentary clerk mid this year.

"We are now waiting for the consultant to make the final tender document to be submitted to the office of the clerk so that the procurement process for a contractor can begin," Kagoye

Asked when construction would start, Kagoye said: "We have some money in this financial year's budget to kick-start that process; if we get that [tender] document now, by January or February the contractor will be on site."

According to Moses Bwalatum, the parliamentary principal information officer, the new state-ofthe-art chamber will have a semi-circular debating hall that will seat 500 MPs and over 700 members of the public. He said it will also have cuttingedge technology with an electronic voting system; each member will have an electronic screen to access bills, the order paper and the constitution.

The speaker will be able to cue members wishing to speak and monitor MPs present. The new building will also have MPs' offices, committee rooms,

a library, a restaurant, a fitness centre and a press lounge sitting over 84 people. The new chamber will be constructed in the North Wing Car Park of Parliament and the existing chamber could be turned into a museum.

"We have made enough research from various parliaments in Africa, Europe, Asia...because most of them are either new or recently refurbished," he

The existing chamber was originally designed to accommodate 82 members but the current 9th Parliament has 375 MPs and the 10th Parliament could have well over 400 lawmakers. Recently when President Museveni ushered his Kenyan counterpart Uhuru Kenyatta into the chamber to address MPs, he claimed he was shocked by its sheer small size. He described it as a "kafunda" (small local bar).
